Why do we offer the sacrifice of the Mass (Eucharist) for our beloved dead? This teaching is based on the practice of prayer for the dead, already mentioned in Sacred Scripture: "Therefore [Judas the ruler of Israel] made atonement for the dead, that they might be delivered from their sin." (II Maccabees 12:46) From the beginning the Church has honored the memory of the dead and offered prayers in suffrage for them, above all the Eucharistic sacrifice, so that, thus purified, they may attain the beatific vision of God. The Church also commends almsgiving, indulgences, and works of penance undertaken on behalf of the dead; Let us help and commemorate them. If Job's sons were purified by their father's sacrifice, why would we doubt that our offerings for the dead bring them some consolation?
